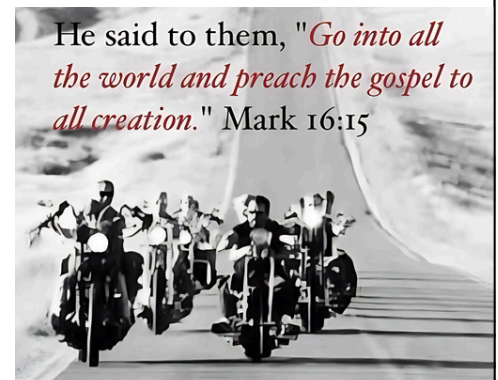

Caribbean Jerk Chicken by Hairy Bikers

Serves 4 - 6P

Prep time: 15 minutes, plus marinating

Cooking time: 25 minutes

Calories: 333 per serving

- 12 boneless, skinless chicken thighs
- lime wedges, to serve
- flaked sea salt
- freshly ground black pepper

Marinade

- 6 spring onions, trimmed and roughly chopped
- 20g chunk of fresh root ginger, peeled and roughly chopped
- 4 garlic cloves, peeled and halved
- 2 - 3 scotch bonnet chillies, stalks removed
- 1 tbsp fresh thyme leaves (or 1 tsp dried thyme)
- 1 tsp ground allspice
- 1/2 tsp ground nutmeg
- 1/2 tsp ground cinnamon
- 3 tbsp dark brown sugar
- 2 tbsp fresh lime juice
- 1 & 1/2 tbsp dark soy sauce

1. To make the marinade, put all the ingredients in a food processor and blitz to make a thick purée. You'll need to remove the lid and push the mixture down a couple of times with a rubber spatula until you get the right consistency.
2. Put the chicken on a board and trim off as much fat as you can with good kitchen scissors. Slash each thigh a couple of times with a sharp knife, put them all in a bowl and season with a little salt and lots of freshly ground black pepper. Tip the jerk marinade on top and mix well, then cover and chill for at least 2 hours or overnight.
3. Preheat the oven to 220C/Fan 200C/Gas7 and line a large baking tray with baking parchment. Place the chicken on the tray, shaking off any excess marinade as you go and shaping the pieces back into neat thighs if they opened out during marinating.
4. Bake the chicken for 25 minutes or until it is all thoroughly cooked, deep golden brown and charred in places. Serve hot or cold with lime wedges for squeezing and a large mixed salad. You could also serve small portions of rice if you like.



VP Corner: Introducing New Vice President by Rod Booher

Rod Booher accepted Jesus into his life as a five-year old boy growing up in Michigan. His father was killed in an automobile accident when he was 11 and subsequently, his mother moved her five children to a small town in western Canada. Rod owned a mopad at age of 13 and then at age of 15 his first motorcycle, a Honda Super Hawk 305. With that motorcycle, Rod worked on a farm during the summer months and on weekends on a small local farm where he first spotted Joy. Later when at college while studying business and he started to dated Joy. They were married in 1975. Although working full time, Rod went to University and completed his degree in 1978 and subsequently obtained his CPA, CA professional destination. Rod worked in a CPA firm from 1976 and then moved to the oil and gas industry in 1984 for the remainder of his career.

In 1979, Rod bought a Goldwing GL 1000 and spent summers traveling with Joy throughout the western states and provinces (AB, BC, WA, OR, CA, AZ, NV, NM, UT, CO, WY, ID, MO) and in 1986 they made a run over to NYC. Their family arrived and focus was on raising their sons, thus motorcycling days were over, however Rod continued to ride on two wheels, bicycling. In 1998, Rod bicycled from Seattle to Washington DC with the American Lung Association "Big Ride".

In 2004 Rod (with family) was transferred from Calgary to Aberdeen, Scotland, and worked there for seven years, then was transferred to Pittsburgh in 2012 and in the following year was relocated to the Woodlands Texas. Retirement was just over three years ago which resulted in Rod purchasing a Goldwing GL1800 and joining CMA Conroe Messengers. Rod has enjoyed serving with CMA at Lone Star Motorcycle Rally, Moto GP in Austin, and various local events. He's thankful for the Messengers and opportunities to serve the Lord with them. He is looking forward to 2025 and what God will be doing.



Well Wielded Words by Chaz Johnson, Chaplain

At this time of the year when we will find ourselves with friends or family we don't always agree with on things. This article just reminds us that our words can build up or tear down. Let's all work on patience and controlling our tongue.

*At mealtime a parent may comfortably give their toddler a spoon, but never a knife. Eventually the child's place setting will include one, but not until there is the maturity and self-control to safely employ its use. Perhaps this restrictive image is one we should recall when we consider God's warning that "rash words are like thrusts of a sword" (Pr.12:18). Sadly, we often prove to be more like toddlers than responsible children when we fail to exercise the needed maturity and self-control to wield our words constructively (Eph.4:29).

A cautious respect for the power of words is something frequently encouraged in Scripture. "How great a forest is set ablaze by such a small fire" we are told in James 3, when advised concerning the serious damage our words can cause (v.5). What huge ships, like the entire course of our lives, can be quickly redirected by such a small rudder (v.4). So let us be reminded of the high cost of immature outbursts and childish rants, and echo the prayer of David: "Set a guard, O Lord, over my mouth; keep watch over the door of my lips! Do not let my heart incline to any evil" (Ps.141:3-4).

Let us heed the instruction of James 1:19 and "be quick to hear, slow to speak, and slow to anger." And let us always remember that when we have cut and injured with our words, our words can also bring healing—begin by making it right with the Lord, as Hosea 14:2 tells us: "Take with you words and return to the Lord; say to him, 'Take away all iniquity.'" And then, of course, let's make it right with each other, as we sincerely apologize, seek forgiveness, and genuinely reaffirm our love for one another. As the exhortation of James on the power of words concludes: "a harvest of righteousness is sown in peace by those who make peace" (3:18).

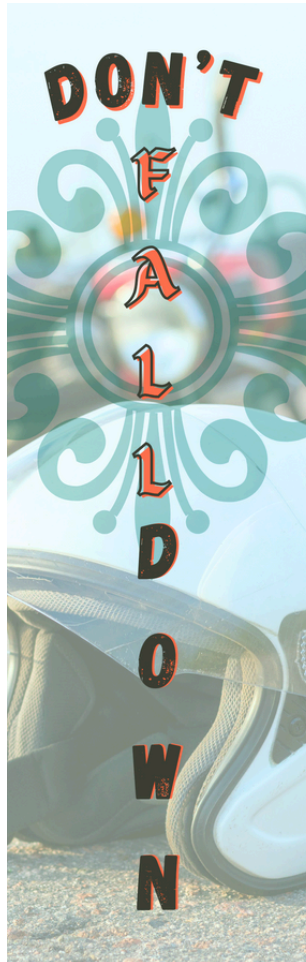

Flying Disaster by Larry, The Safety Guy

Years ago, the company I was working for, Ansul fire protection, gave me a company car. It was a big Pontiac. I was going down one of the Houston freeways following several vehicles including a 10-wheel dump truck. As I was going down the road something got caught between the dual rear tires of the dump truck in front of me. This item was launched skyward. I didn't know what it was, but it looked heavy. I slowed the car down and watch this thing fall from the sky. I didn't stop quick enough. The lump dropped from the sky, went through the hood of the car into the ground. Investigation revealed that it was a large shock absorber that had come off the dump truck. The truck had driven over its dislodged shock absorber, the shock absorber had gotten caught between the dual tires at the back of the truck and was launched skyward as it came out from behind the truck.

I had forgotten about this incident until a couple of months ago when I was on the Indian on Highway 45 going south. In front of me was a 10-wheel dump truck. Out from behind the back of the truck came something big, about the size of a football, that was launched skyward from between the dual tires. Remembering my experience with the Pontiac, I pulled the Indian onto the side of the road and waited for the item to fall from the sky. It turned out to be a large chunk of hard mud. Had that thing hit me or the bike, there would have been some serious damage.

When we're out riding, we must be aware of our surroundings. If there is a large vehicle in front of us with dual rear wheels, we need to be cognizant of what could come out from behind it. The other important observation is things that pick-up trucks may straddle in the road. These objects laying in the road can cause us to have an accident. Leaving sufficient distance between you and the vehicle in front of you is important. This distance allows you to compensate for things that may be laying in the road or things that may be falling from the sky from dual rear wheels.

Here is one good devotional from Greg Laurie!

"One of my favorite verses in all of Scripture is Jeremiah 29:11. I quote it so often that some people might think I'm slightly obsessed with it. It says, "I know the thoughts that I think toward you, says the LORD, thoughts of peace and not of evil, to give you a future and a hope" (NKJV).

I like that verse so much that I had those words inscribed on the back of a watch that I gave my son Christopher for his twenty-first birthday. Years later, Christopher went to be with the Lord after a tragic accident.

After he died, I was given a little plastic bag that contained his belongings. In it were his wallet, his keys, and his watch. I took the watch out, held it in my hand, flipped it over, and saw the inscription. Where's the future for me?

I had to remind myself that it's not all about our life on earth. Our ultimate future is in Heaven. That's where it all comes together. As Christians, we're in a win-win situation. Paul wrote in Philippians 1:21, "For to me, living means living for Christ, and dying is even better" (NLT).

Discerning God's Will by Joy Booher, Treasurer

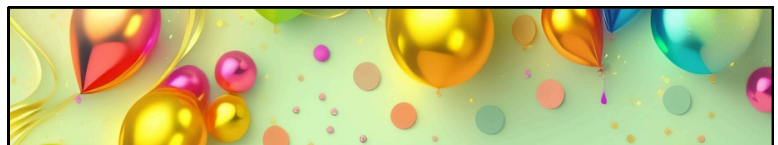

In the south central region of Malawi, you'll find a town called Blantyre which is the second largest city in Malawi, Africa with a vast cultural diversity. This is the area that Pastor Verson ministers in. In Blantyre, Pastor Verson received a motorcycle. He was very excited and overcome with emotion about being blessed with a motorcycle.

The next day, Verson met with the CMA mission team and said he and his family stayed up all night looking at the bike! He could not believe this amazing blessing! This motorcycle will help him visit members who live faraway and to make hospital visits!

Verson stayed with the team while traveling to south Malawi. Verson and one of our team members, Don Kentch, rode in a pick up along the dusty roads. They shared their personal testimonies with each other. This is Verson's story as told by Don: Verson testified how he came to know God. He was living life as a thief. One day, Verson and his friends planned to steal from a construction site, however, God began to deal with him. Instead, Verson stayed home, in his

room for 5 days as God revealed himself to him. He states he heard Angels singing. On the 6th day, he visited his friend and learned he had the same experience with God that Verson had. Where Are My Skills? Part 3 by James "Russell" Rhodes, Road Captain

Hello from your friendly Road Captain. As we enter the new year, here are the last "WHERE ARE MY SKILLS AT?" tips and tricks from the April 2021 Motorcycle Tourer. Check out prior Messenger newsletters for the first 14 tips!

15. Fitness Matters. Without going off-piste here, fitness is a cornerstone of life. And when it comes to riding, having good physical health usually correlates with having good mental health, too. And it also improves your ability to stave off fatigue – which means you can ride for longer before you get tired. From a physical standpoint, having decent strength through resistance training gives you better bike control. Additionally, it could stop you from dropping it and will certainly help with picking your bike up even if you do drop it.

16. Don't Ride When You're Mad. I don't need to tell you the symptoms of getting mad. How many times have you snapped at an innocent family member or partner for no other reason than you're pissed off? And I guess that most of the time, you didn't mean to – it was uncontrollable. So you can see how this can be detrimental on a bike. Acceleration becomes aggressive. Braking becomes hard and uneven. You may take risks due to a lack of patience. Or you might act aggressively towards other road users for otherwise minor infractions. But riding mad increases your chances of having an accident. That heavy throttle or heavy braking on wet roads could cause you to lose control. And those rash decisions made through a lack of patience could cause you to make a terrible misjudgment.

17. You Can Still Have Fun On A Small Bike. If you're a new rider, don't be sucked into the stigma that you need a big bike. Because you don't. Smaller bikes are lighter, easier, and cheaper. And their versatility means they will put a smile on your face a whole lot more than their bigger, more serious counterparts. There are plenty of A2-friendly bikes these days that are wicked fun to ride.

18. A Good Mechanic Is Worth Their Weight In Gold. Taking your bike to the garage isn't the same as taking your car. You have enough to contend with on the roads without having doubts about your bike. Take the time to find a good mechanic who you trust. Ask around at bike clubs. Read reviews on Google and social media. Ask people you trust who they use. Chances are, the same name will keep cropping up. And when it does, become

best friends with them. Because although expensive, a good mechanic is worth their weight in gold.

19. Don't Scrimp On Tires. The first time I bought a new(ish) bike, it cost me \$6,500. And because I bought it in cash, I decided to wait until my next payday before replacing the tires that I could feel were twitchy in wet conditions. What happened? Whilst waiting for my next wage, I went for a ride out in Wales. Where it began to rain. Not only was it a lengthy insurance process, but I also had to cancel my long-awaited tour as I had no bike. Good tires make a huge difference to your riding – whether on-road or off it. Do yourself a favor and get some decent tires. They make a world of difference.

20. Learn How To Brake. To this day, I'm surprised at how many people don't brake properly on a bike. When you're in an empty car park practicing your slow riding (above), be sure to practice your braking. You need to know how the bike will react if you brake hard in an emergency. If you find yourself in a situation where you need to brake hard, you don't have time to think about it. So cement the muscle memory to do the braking for you when you need it.

21. Learn How To Use The Back Brake! While on the subject of brakes, don't neglect your rear brake. At slow speeds, using the back brake makes everything so much smoother and neater. But mastering your back brake also improves slow riding and maneuvers such as u-turns, negotiating mini-roundabouts, and even hairpin bends.

22. Sometimes It's Easier To Take The Car. If your motorcycle is your only means of transport, then you don't really have a choice. But don't feel like you need to go everywhere on a bike just because you own one. Sometimes, going in the car is just easier. It's warm, safe, and has climate control and comfortable seats. And much of the time, going to work on your bike takes longer than going in your car. By the time you've unlocked the bike, got it out of the garage, got to work, and then got changed out of your bike gear, it would've been easier to go in the car!

Motorcycle Riding Tips & Tricks Conclusion: So there we have it! For new riders, this post should stand you in good stead for what you're letting yourself in for! For experienced riders, I hope it gives you something to think about also.

History of CMA

The original brainstorm for such an organization occurred in 1972 when Herb Shreve and his teenage son purchased their first motorcycles. It was not until 1974 when the need for a new organization began to be realized. Herb attended his first motorcycle rally and saw a massive crowd of motorcyclists who did not know Jesus Christ as their personal Savior. In fact, many had never heard the Gospel message.

The realization of such a great need prompted Herb to share his vision with a couple of Christian friends. Together, they began to pray. Herb became more and more convinced that God wanted a Christian organization dedicated to reaching motorcyclists with the Gospel of Jesus Christ. In the spring of 1975, he put action to his prayers. An attorney was contacted, and a nonprofit charter was applied for and approved. The waiting was over. The Christian Motorcyclists Association (CMA) was born.
